Alan's Art Deco explores the uniquely Australian way Art Deco manifested in Australia through the work of 20th century artist Alan D. Baker. The exhibition takes viewers back in time, framing Baker's commercial art in the context of its era.

Art Deco is first and foremost a style. Years in the making, its vision came into full force after WWI spawned from the desire to discard the past and celebrate a bright, modern future. Distinguished by clean shapes and lines, geometric and stylised ornamentation and above all, a celebration of the luxury of modernity, the style influenced every visual medium, from architecture to fine art. Art Deco truly began to make its mark on Australian design and art in the 1930s. It was actively spread in a distinctly Australian way when Tooth advertisements in newspapers, magazines, and Co., a major 20th-century beer brewer in restaurant menus and theatre programmes. NSW, incorporated the Art Deco style in their Alan D. Baker was one of these artists.

pub designs. The brewery, and their competitor Tooheys, acquired existing pubs to refurbish, adding Art Deco motifs and facades as well as constructing entirely new Art Deco buildings. To advertise the products sold within these pubs, Tooth and Co. commissioned artists to paint posters and murals to adorn their interior and exterior walls. The breweries also commissioned artwork to use as print collateral. This included artwork for bottle labels and coasters, and





ALAN D. BAKER (1914-1987)

Alan D. Baker, to whom Alan Baker Art Gallery is dedicated, was a prolific local artist. He influenced the Australian art scene as the vicepresident of the Royal Art Society of New South Wales and as a repeat exhibitor in the Archibald and Wynne Prizes. His works are held in collections across Australia, the Alan Baker Art Gallery housing a permanent collection of significant pieces. Baker, like many of his contemporaries, also worked as a commercial artist.



GALLERY 1

This series of works was created by Alan D. Baker during the 1930s - 1950s. Unlike his commercial artwork from this era which celebrated an idealised vision of modern Australian life, his fine art provides a glimpse into Baker's world during one of the most turbulent periods of the 20th century. During the 1930s when the Great Depression was in full force, Baker transformed from an art student to an art instructor at the J.S. Watkins Art School. After the closure of the art school, following the retirement of John Watkins in 1938, Baker turned to commercial art for his income. This pursuit was briefly interrupted by WWII when Baker served in Papua New Guinea. He resumed his commercial art career upon his return to Australia.





Hickson Road (1933) is a significant historical artefact. The cityscape traces the edges of the wharves the road once bordered, then occupied by shipping companies. It was during the Great Depression, at the time of Baker's painting, that Hickson Road became known as "The Hungry Mile." The name referenced the plight of the wharf labourers who would crowd around the dockyard gates before sunrise trying to get a day's work, but more often than not, would go home hungry.

When you open a newspaper, magazine or theatre programme today, most advertisements are created digitally. In the 1930s - 1950s, artists created artwork for print by hand. The series of works in Gallery 2 were created by Alan D. Baker for Tooth and Co. using a scratchboard. The scratchboard originated in Europe in the 19th century as a cheaper and quicker alternative to other existing print-making methods. It was particularly effective for newspaper image printing as the original artwork could be reproduced using photolithography while retaining the fine lines of the original piece. The scratchboard technique requires the artist to use sharp knives or tools, or "scratch knives," to scrape dark ink off a surface to reveal the white clay beneath.







GALLERY 4

Baker's original commercial paintings depict classic Art Deco scenes with flawless figures, precise draftsmanship and idealised scenes. Baker's success as a commercial artist supported him as he established his career as a fine artist and started a family. In 1946, Baker married Marjorie Kingsell, a fellow student of J.S. Watkins Art School and someone who he had reconnected with after the war. Baker painted many portraits of Marjorie during their marriage. *Artist's Wife*, painted in 1953, was a finalist in the Archibald Prize. It is one of two portraits of Marjorie featured in Gallery IV.






